Savannah Green, an unwitting half blood Greek god, dies in an untimely death on her eighteenth birthday in modern day New York. Her mother Phoebe has always tried to protect her and keep the divine world a secret from her, along with who her father really is. Savannah's soul, however, is not harvested to be taken to the Underworld upon her death. Instead, she is immediately employed by the god of Death, Thanatos, as a Grim Reaper. She must now harvest the souls of other human beings -with the aid of Trainer Søren. While still learning, betrayal and rage get the better of Savannah and she reaps a soul long before its time, dooming it to roam the divine world for eternity. Death hears of this and calls her in along with her Trainer to fire them, but in new light that

Savannah is actually his younger half sister, he decides to give a lenient punishment instead. Savannah and Søren then stumble upon two Detached Grim Reapers, Nadine and her brother Lewis, on the run from the Authorities. Through a mutually beneficial deal, the four Reapers remain hidden from Thanatos and his security team. The Reapers then find a mysterious book holding all of the treaties past and present written by the Olympian gods -including one specifying that half blood gods are not allowed to exist. Savannah must now fight for her life against Horkos, the god of Oaths, who will stop at nothing to annihilate her. The Grim Reapers then race across the continent to New York to rally numbers in preparation for a battle. Savannah plans to visit her mother to say goodbye in case she does not make it, but finds out about her father before she can do so. Hades, her father, shows up at the house, and this triggers Savannah's godly power -fire. Hades tells Savannah all about how she came to be, and his history with her mother. With renewed motivation, Savannah journeys to Olympus with her father to reason with the gods and prevent a war. Thanatos reveals that he is Savannah's half brother. The rest of the trial doesn't go according to plan, but Hades saves Savannah's life by sending her back to New York. The Grim Reapers in the apartment building are in conflict over fighting Savannah's battle with her, but many decide to go after Thanatos gives a short and persuasive speech. The Grim Reapers and gods then fight in the middle of New York, and Savannah finally manages to succeed in convincing Zeus to end the battle and keep half bloods alive. But just as she does so with Hera, Nadine gives her life when Horkos attempts to strike from behind. Savannah avenges Nadine and kills Horkos in turn -bringing about the climax of the battle where she is confronted by Artemis, Apollo and Poseidon. The god of the sea threatens to flood out the fighting but Savannah halts his plans with quick thinking. Crisis averted, Zeus must still punish Savannah for killing a god -which he does by making her the goddess of half blood gods. She must now protect and guide all children of the gods, at any cost. And this begins with her nephew, a son of Death, the next Halloween. Told in rhyme, this story follows Susan through a series of activities, from swimming to riding a horse.
